Sometimes, something you think of as a negative thing turns out to be an advantage on the job. Though he is only 18 years old and blind, Süleyman Gökyiğit is among the top computer technicians and programmers at InteliData Technologies Corp., a large software company in the US.

"After two computer networks combined into one last October, we were going crazy," recalls Douglas Braun, a vice president. We couldn't even send e-mail to each other." In three weeks, Mr. Gökyiğit, a student at the University of Toledo working part-time at InteliData's office, created the software to integrate the two networks. "None of the company's 350 other employees could have done the job in three months," says Mr. Braun. "Süleyman can literally 'see' into the heart of the computer."

Mr. Gökyiğit's gift is an exceptional ability to visualize how a machine works. "The computer permits me to reach out into the world and do almost anything I want to do," says Mr. Gökyiğit.

Like most blind people working with computers, Mr. Gökyiğit uses a voice-synthesizer that reads the video on his monitor in a mechanical voice. Devices that produce displays specifically for blind people are also available, but Mr. Gökyiğit says they "waste time." Instead, he depends on memory. Turning the synthesizer to top speed, he remembers almost everything he hears until a project is completed. While the synthesizer talks, Mr. Gökyiğit mentally "maps" the computer screen and memorizes the location of each icon on the screen, so he can call up files with his mouse.

He is also at home with hardware, thanks to a highly developed sense of touch, using Braille which is an alphabet for the blind. Mitzi Nowakowski, an office manager at InteliData, recalls how he easily disconnected and reconnected their computer systems during a move last year. "Through feel, Süleyman can work much faster than most other people with sight," she says.

Mr. Gökyiğit was born in Turkey, where he developed an eye condition that left him blind at age two. His parents brought him to a hospital in the US, but nothing could be done. "His doctors kept emphasizing, 'Never shelter him or pity him," says his father. Today, Mr. Gökyiğit's co-workers call him "Süleyman the Magnificent" after an Ottoman Empire sultan in the 16th century.

Several months ago, Mr. Braun had difficulty accessing the company's network using his laptop on a trip. Instead of asking someone to manually do it, he called Mr. Gökyiğit, who memorized the logbook and produced the proper numbers "in ten seconds," Mr. Braun says. Mr. Gökviğit is the only company employee on call 24 hours a day. "We consider him our top problem solver," says Mr. Braun.
