Usually, people think of genius meaning highly intelligent person, whether it is in Mozart's composition of symphonies at
age five or Einstein's discovery of relativity, as having a quality not just of the supernatural, but also of the unusual. People
see genius as a good abnormality; moreover, they think of genius as a completely unpredictable abnormality. Until recently,
psychologists regarded the qualities of genius as too unpredictable to describe intelligibly; however, Anna Findley's study
uncovers predictable patterns in the biographies of geniuses. These patterns do not reject the common belief that there is
a kind of supernatural thing in the lives of unusually talented men and women, however, even though they occur with
regularity. For example, 34, and one of them always occurs shortly before their deaths; this is true whether the
genius lives to 19 or 90.

Taking Care

In bringing up children, every parent, whatever their ethnicity, income, education, or geographic location is, watches closely the child's learning of each new skill. However, it is often tempting to hurry the child beyond his natural learning rate, which can set up dangerous feelings of failure and states of worry in the child. This might happen at any stage. A baby might be forced to use a toilet too early; a young child might be encouraged to learn to read before he knows the meaning of the words he reads. On the other hand, if a child, however, is left alone too much, or without any learning opportunities, he loses his natural <u>drive</u> for life and his desire to find out new things for himself. Parents vary greatly in their degree of strictness towards their children. Some may be especially strict in money matters. Others give importance to times of coming home at night or punctuality for meals. In general, these obligations represent the needs of the parents and the values of the community as well as the child's own benefit.
